Telephone



- Phone calls are a great way to communicate however can sometimes be difficult for young people with SEND to access or not preferred
- Limited availability
- Not always suitable for CYP due to physical or mental needs

Email



- A good way to communicate but not always suitable/ preferred by CYP
- Response times may be an issue
- · Junk mail/information overload

Social Media





- A great way for CYP to find out what you are about/ research
- A fast, modern way to ask a question
- Group pages/ discussion rooms
- Sharing information with a group who are involved

Easy Read



- Easy read options are a great way to be more inclusive with resources and information
- Is suitable for CYP and adults
- 'At a glance' information
- Not too much 'information overload'
- It is important that pictures describe the text (please see more in Photosymbols)

- Easy to read topics 'at a glance'
- Pictures should describe text
- Headings, description and words can be explained in this format
- 'Comic strip' style reading that flows whether you are reading or looking at images
- Clear words
- Text size, font, colour that could make it more accessible to readers

Dolphin Computer Access







- Accessibility for sight loss, visual impairment and dyslexia
- Converts Word documents into a Iternative formats including large print, braille, MP3 and ePub

- Free accessible reading app

Word Accessibility Tool checker

Use the Accessibility Checker

- On the ribbon, select the Review tab. If you're using Outlook, note that you'll only see the Review
 tab when writing or replying to messages.
- 2. Select Check Accessibility.



Review your results. You'll see a list of errors, warnings, and tips with how-to-fix recommendations for each. See Rules for the Accessibility Checker for more information.

Fix recommendations with ease

To easily address accessibility errors and warnings, select an issue to open the **Recommended Actions** list. You can apply a one-click fix by selecting an action, or select the arrow button next to an action for more options.



- Free to use
- Word, Excel & Powerpoint
- Most programs we use daily have this tool
- Headings, fonts, size, colour, words in place of images, wording and links
- Checks your work for anything that might have accessibility issues for readers
- Gives recommendations for changes

Advocate/ supporter



- · Others offering support
- Teachers, parents, carers, Family
 Support Workers, SENDIASS, friends/
 peers
- CYP can benefit from being supported or having an advocate that can voice their views if they are not able to themselves
- This can be for meetings, reviews and at school/setting

Video or voice recording




Online Meeting Platforms

Zoom, Teams, etc



- CYP can use a voice record method to think about what they would like to say and record it at home
- This can be shared with relevant professionals if the CYP agrees
- The CYP can give their views without being present at a meeting
- Some CYP can use this method for Annual Reviews if they have an EHCP
- CYP are familiar with online meetings
- Easy to access if internet is available
- Only possible if they have smartphone, tablet or laptop
- Outside surroundings may interfere with meetings/ concentration
- Some CYP prefer this method as it is familiar to them, however some may not wish to use camera or voice options but can still feel part of a meeting


Face to face meetings

- Interactive presentation software
- Phone to screen access
- Voting system
- Collaborative work
- Anonymous options
- Quizzes, polls, visualise responses
- A great way to communicate but can be quite daunting for CYP to feel involved with a group of professionals
- May wish for supporter/ advocate present
- Some CYP might prefer to give input in a different way and send the info to be shared at a meeting without them present
- Sometimes unfamiliar: people, circumstances, professionals, etc

Interactive Annual Review activity for Children & Young People

'How to' Guide

Here is a really useful way that you can give your views in an Annual Review without actually having to say a word (If that's what you prefer). This activity allows you to share your thoughts on all things about school/college and education. You might wish to do this on your own or ask a parent or carer to help you.

What you will need:

- Picture cards printed out
- Scissor
- A clear area to sit (like at a table or floor space)
- A camera or phone to take a picture



Step 1

Print off the picture cards and cut each one out separately



Step 2

Find somewhere comfy to sit and lay out the thumbs cards like this



Step 3

Make a pile of your picture cards and look at each one carefully. Take the first card and place it under the heading that you think.

(Helpful hint: try not to question the child/ young person's choices as they go through- you can do this at the end to understand their thought processes)

Step 4

Once you have placed all your cards in their places it might look something like this...



Step 5

Take a picture of your interactive Annual Review activity and you can send this directly to your SENCO at school or college. This will help them understand your views before an Annual Review to see what things are going well or not so well and how they can help you. You can update your activity as many times as you want.

Key Words and Jargon

SEND	Special Educational Needs & Disabilities	A child/ young person that has a Special Educational Need and/ or Disability
ЕНСР	Education Health & Care Plan	Legal document highlighting a child/ young person's needs and provisions
SEN	Special Educational Need	A child/ young person that needs support in education
SEP	Special Educational Provision	Support that is put in place for a child/ young person
SES	Special Education Service	The Local Authority service that write and maintain EHCP's
CAMHS	Child & Adolescent Mental Health Service	A service to support parents/ carers or young people themselves to give information, advice and support in a confidential and impartial way
SENDIASS	Special Educational Needs & Disability Information, Advice & Support Service	A service to support parents/ carers or young people themselves to give information, advice and support in a confidential and impartial way
LA	Local Authority	Authority responsible for all children/ young people in their area
LO	Local Offer (Local Authority website)	The Local Authority Website that supports parents/ carers and young people with SEND including information about schools/ colleges & accessing groups/ support
